



The Boy Scouts of America, Alamo Area Council earned the Journey to Excellence Silver Award status based on our performance in membership, program, unit service, district leadership and governance, and finance. Most importantly, we impacted the lives of more youth that we did in 2012.

### Counted among our 2013 successes:

Camping - Cub Scout & Boy Scout Camping programs had another fantastic year with 6,477 youth attending our summer and yearround programs.

Eagle Scouts - 342 Boy Scouts achieved Scouting's highest rank of Eagle Scout, contributing over 57,798 service hours with a value equaling \$1,279,647.72 (million) invested into our local economy and community.\*

Advancement - 13,467 merit badges earned by Boy Scouts with total Cub Scout and Boy Scout rank advancements at 10.854.

Do you ever stop to consider the IMPACT our Eagle Scouts make in our communities today and in the future? 342 youth in the Alamo Area Council achieved the rank of Eagle Scout in 2013. These Scouts earned the required 21 merit badges, held leadership positions in their troop, and made a significant contribution to their communities with their Eagle Scout projects.

These exceptional young men provided leadership to other young men in their troop. school, or place of worship and performed an average of 100 hours of service per project. Eagle Scouts from the Alamo Area Council performed almost 58,000 hours of community service with an economic impact of over \$1.27 million to our local communities.



One local Eagle Scout, Nicholas Guerra, was recognized as the recipient of the 2013 Alamo Area Council Glenn A. and Melinda W. Adams National Eagle Scouts Service Project of the Year Award. The Adams Family Award is a National BSA honor for outstanding Eagle Scouts service projects throughout the country. His project was selected as the most outstanding in the Alamo Area Council of the 342 service projects completed during 2013.
