Commissioner's Minute

At the recent Scouting America National Annual Meeting in Orlando, a new mandatory training course entitled Safeguarding Youth was announced and is now live. This training is required for all registered adult volunteers and is also a joining requirement for all new adult members. The course takes approximately 90 minutes and is available in English and Spanish. Volunteers can access it by logging into my.scouting.org.

Once the course has been completed, volunteers must take a 15-minute annual refresher course and pass a retest each year to remain compliant. For those who have already completed Youth Protection Training (YPT), their certification remains valid until expiration or one year from the launch of the new training, whichever is shorter.

This update is part of Scouting America's continued commitment to youth protection, emphasizing active supervision, situational awareness, and a safety culture.

Safety Moment - Hazardous Trees in Scouting

Scouting adventures thrive in the great outdoors—along trails, at campsites, deep in forests, and beneath the shelter of towering trees. One of the most often overlooked, yet potentially life-threatening, hazards is the presence of hazardous trees.

What Is a Hazardous Tree? Hazardous trees can: Cause serious injury or death, destroy tents, vehicles, or other property, Obstruct trails, emergency routes, or camp access roads.

Before / During Campouts or Outdoor Events: Inspect campsites and activity zones for signs of hazardous trees. Avoid placing tents or program areas under dead, leaning, or visibly damaged trees. Make tree safety checks a part of your standard walkthrough.
